#### **Get your Taxes Done Early**

There are three really important reasons for completing taxes early:

- You'll receive your refund sooner; in less than 10 days if you file electronically. Be patient, avoid the refund anticipation loan and keep more of your money.
- You won't be rushing so you'll make fewer mistakes. You'll have time to see if you qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit, or the Child Tax Credit, or the Savers Tax Credit.

### **Don't Fall for Phishing Scams**

Last week the Banking Department received several calls from residents with concerns about a text message they had received. The message pretends to be from a local institution and asks residents to call a specific phone number and enter their account information.

Remember never give your personal information to anyone who contacts you by text message, phone, or email. This is probably a "phishing" scam to steal your financial information. If you did enter your information, contact your financial institution immediately. You may need to close your account.
