I. Discussion

- a. A complete review of arrests made during 2011 was conducted with specific emphasis on potential race and gender profiling. Utilizing IMC Records Management System, statistics were generated for the following categories:
 - i. Gender
 - 1. Male
 - 2. Female
 - ii. Race
 - 1. Asian/Pacific Islander
 - 2. Black
 - 3. American Indian/Alaskan Native
 - 4. Unknown
 - 5. Hispanic
 - 6. White

- b. It shall be noted that for purposes of reviewing race, categories one thru five were consolidated while category six was kept separate.

III. Explanation

- a. As outlined in the above diagram, the total population for the State of New Hampshire is 1,318,194 of that 49.3 % are male and 50,7 % are female. Comparatively speaking, of the 381 arrests made during 2011, 65% were male, while 35% were female. While the ratio of arrests from male to

female are somewhat different than the State ratio, there is not enough of a discrepancy to warrant a concern in regards to gender biasness.

- b. After review of race within the State of New Hampshire, it has been stated that 93.9% of the population is white, while 6.1 % of the population is minority. The arrests for 2011 are extremely close to this ratio with 93% or 381 arrests were white, compared to 7% or 26 arrests being minority. I can see no area of concern regarding bias based issues with arrests.
- c. Traditional motor vehicle enforcement, while allowable under certain circumstances, is not within the scope of normal duties for the Division of Liquor Enforcement and Licensing. As a result there were thirty motor vehicle citations issued during this time period, all of which bring no concern to bias based profiling.

IV. Final Review

- a. After an in-depth administrative review of departmental practices, policies and officer contact information, it is concluded that racial or gender based profiling is not taking place.
