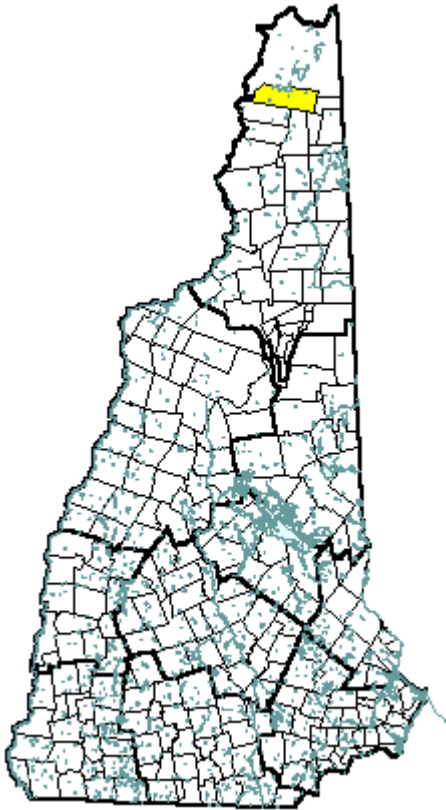

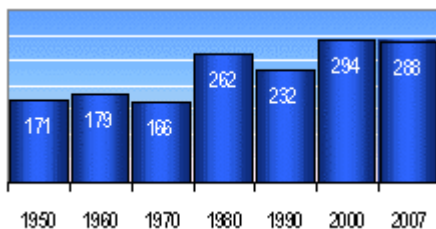
Incorporated: 1853

Origin: Clarksville was originally part of a large tract deeded by legislature to Dartmouth College in 1789, portions of which were sold to raise cash for the college. The land was purchased by two Dartmouth graduates, Joseph Murdock of Norwich, Vermont, and Benjamin Clark of Boston, and cleared for settlement by the Clark family. The town was incorporated as Clarksville in 1853, but was also known as Dartmouth College Grant until 1872. Clarksville is the second most northerly incorporated township in New Hampshire, lying south only to Pittsburg.

Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 88 residents in 1830

Population Trends: Population change for Clarksville totaled 123 over 50 years, from 171 in 1950 to 294 in 2000. The largest decennial percent change was a 58 percent increase between 1970 and 1980, a numeric increase of 96. The 2007 Census estimate for Clarksville was 288 residents, which ranked 226th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.



Population Density and Land Area (NH Office of Energy & Planning): 5.7 persons per square mile of land area, the seventh lowest among the cities and towns. Clarksville contains 60.4 square miles of land area and 1.9 square miles of inland water area.
