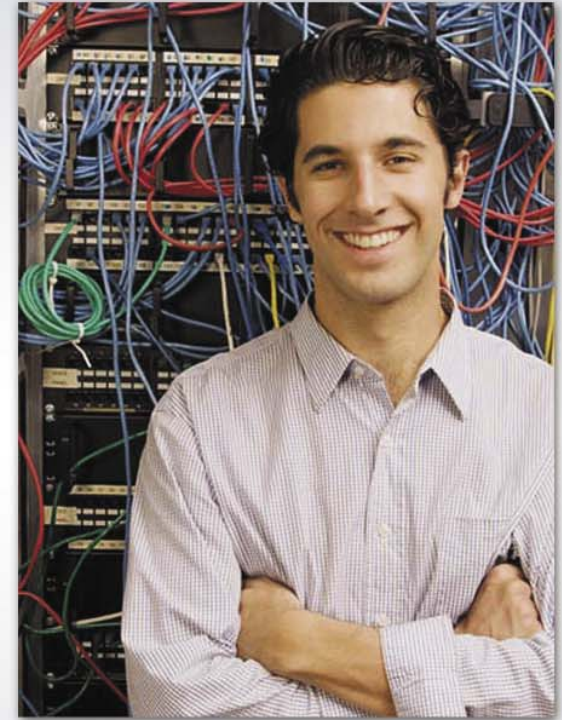

What is Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeship bridges the gap between the education system and the world of work. In the simplest terms, apprenticeship blends classroom instruction with practical experience supervised by a professional on the worksite. Apprenticeship training programs are designed to meet state and federal regulations, and are registered with the New Hampshire Apprenticeship Council.

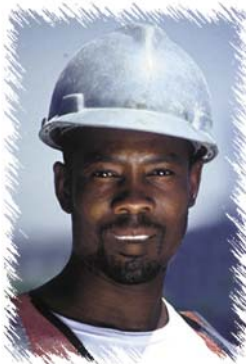


What is Registered Youth Apprenticeship?

It is an opportunity for youth in their final years of high school to begin a registered apprenticeship program in the occupation of their choice.

The Employer

Provides structured on-the-job training. Maintains simple records with the apprentice. Defines pay rates, including wage increments.



The Student

Through a registered youth apprenticeship, students:

- Can begin earning wages while still in high school
- Establish a career ladder
- Relate learning to the job
- Get employer commitment to long-term training
- Continue education beyond high school

Benefits:

- Full time employment
- Supervised training
- Opportunity to learn a skill
- Increasing scale of wages
- Nationally recognized Certificate of Completion
- Improved job security
- Quality training opportunity



An Apprenticeship Occupation Provides:

- Training that is clearly recognized throughout an industry;
- Training learned in a practical way through a systematic program of on-the-job training;
- Training in manual, mechanical, or technical skills; and
- Required related instruction that supplements on-the-job training.



What does an Apprentice earn?

Apprentices earn while they learn. An apprentice starting out in a particular trade without any prior experience must receive at least 50% of the wages paid to a fully trained craftsman. An apprentice's wages increase at regular intervals corresponding with his or her increasing knowledge of the occupation.
