He holds a Bachelor's degree from the University of New Hampshire and is accredited as a certified planner from the American Institute of Certified Planners (AICP), an organization of the American Planning Association.

Kathie Northrup, Chair, Hooksett Heritage Commission

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Kathie Northrup has been the Chair of the Hooksett Heritage Commission since it was reinstated in 2003. She is responsible for implementing the Historic Marker Program, conducting most of the interviews in the oral history project, and writing the application for Hooksett's designation as a Preserve America Community. Ms. Northrup wrote successful applications to list three municipal properties on the NH State Register of Historic Places, including Head School (c. 1839), an ongoing preservation project. She has obtained several grants for Heritage Commission work including a Conservation License Plate Grant for interior work at Head School. In 2007 Kathy led the effort that resulted in the adoption of the Community Revitalization Tax Incentive program. She was on the board of directors of Robie's Country Store Historic Preservation Corp. from 1998 to 2004, serving as Vice President from 2001 to 2004.

Carol Ogilvie, Director, Office of Community Development, Town of Peterborough

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Carol Ogilvie has more than 20 years of land use planning experience in the State of New Hampshire, 14 of them spent with the Southwest Region Planning Commission providing planning and zoning assistance to member towns. Ms. Ogilvie is a native of the Monadnock Region in southwestern NH, a graduate of Keene State College, and earned her Master's Degree from Kent State University in 1979. The Town of Peterborough has employed her as the Director of the Office of Community Development since 2003, where her responsibilities include oversight of and staff support to a number of boards and committees involved with land use issues, and involvement with economic development including the administration of three Tax Increment Finance Districts.

Nadine Peterson, Preservation Planner, NH Division of Historical Resources

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Nadine Peterson is the Preservation Planner for the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources. She oversees federally funded and permitted project review and assists agencies in determining affects to historic resources. She also works directly with New Hampshire's Heritage and Historic District Commissions on community preservation projects helping them implement best practices in historic preservation. Ms. Peterson graduated from Tulane University and the University of Vermont with a Master's degree in Historic Preservation and has eighteen years of experience in the preservation field. Prior to joining the NHDHR, she worked with the New Hampshire Department of Transportation assisting the Cultural Resources Manager in coordinating cultural resource investigations. Nadine was the Director of Historic Preservation with a private cultural resources consulting firm in Pennsylvania before coming to NH. Ms. Peterson works with municipalities, developers, and key community stakeholders to identify preservation tools to protect significant resources and provide better understanding of historic properties through presentations and workshops.

Cynthia J. Robinson, Planning Coordinator, Town of Chester

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Cynthia Robinson has been in land use planning for 25 years starting as a volunteer for the development of Chester's first Master Plan, then as Recording Secretary and Board member. In 1993 she went to work for the Planning Board as their Administrative Assistant. In 1996 she graduated Summa Cum Laude from Hesser College with an Associates Degree in Business Science majoring in Paralegal Studies. This led to her becoming the Board's Planning Coordinator whose responsibility it is to ensure all aspects of land use planning are kept up to date with current land use laws and practices. Ms. Robinson is also a Commissioner for the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission, Tree Warden and a member of the Highway Safety Committee and the newly formed Energy Committee.

Jack Ruderman, Director, Sustainable Energy, NH Public Utilities Commission

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Jack Ruderman is Director of the Sustainable Energy Division at the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission. He is responsible for management of the state's Renewable Energy Fund and Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction Fund, both recently created to advance New Hampshire's sustainable energy goals. Prior to working at DES, he was actively engaged in efforts that targeted reductions in greenhouse gas reductions through community-based behavior change campaigns as well as innovative building design projects. Eric Steltzer, Energy Policy Analyst, NH Office of Energy and Planning

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Eric Steltzer is an Energy Policy Analyst for the NH Office of Energy and Planning. He has extensive experience in renewable energy, energy efficiency, and community engagement. Prior to his work at OEP, Eric received his Masters in Resource Economics and Development from the University of New Hampshire and worked as a Regional Planner for Rockingham Planning Commission. Maggie Stier, Field Service Representative, NH Preservation Alliance

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Maggie Stier serves as shared field service representative for the NH Preservation Alliance and the National Trust for Historic Preservation, providing statewide assistance to individuals and organizations involved in the preservation of our state's historic built environment. As an appointed member of the State Parks Advisory Council, she is helping to shape a new strategic plan for our state parks and historic sites. Ms. Stier was the founding executive director of The Fells on Lake Sunapee from 1997 through 2004, overseeing the development of the historic estate's buildings, gardens, and environmental programs. She has been an adjunct professor at Plymouth State University and Colby Sanyer College, and holds degrees from Vassar, Boston University, and Antioch New England.

Jeffery H. Taylor, President, Jeffrey H. Taylor & Associates

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Mr. Taylor began his planning career with the City of Berlin, NH, in 1977. There he was responsible for zoning and subdivision issues, grant writing, and project administration. He later became director of all community and economic development for the city. He attracted in excess of \$10,000,000 in public grant funds to this community of 12,000 people. In 1989 Mr. Taylor was asked by then Governor Judd Gregg to become the Director of the NH Office of State Planning. Mr. Taylor remained on in that capacity under Governors Steven Merrill and Jeanne Shaheen. In January of 2003, Mr. Taylor formed Jeffrey H. Taylor and Associates to provide consulting services in the areas of community planning and economic development to northern New England communities. Mr. Taylor is the winner of numerous awards for his work in community planning; in 2003 he was named an honorary member of the NH chapter of the American Institute of Architects and was awarded for outstanding leadership from the NH Preservation Alliance.

Christine Walker, Executive Director, Upper Valley Lake Sunapee RPC

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Christine Walker was recently hired as the Executive Director of the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission. She has more than seven years experience in the planning industry. She worked as the Economic Development Planning Coordinator funded through the US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration and assisted the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Committee in maintaining a regional Economic Strategy while at North Country Council.
