BACKGROUND

On January 31, 1997, the International Chemical Workers Union, UFCW (Union) filed a petition for certification of a bargaining unit of two hundred and thirty (230) members for the positions described in PELRB Decision 95-80 issued on September 7, 1995. On February 14, 1997, Merrimack County (County) filed exceptions to the petition for certification. Also, on February 14, 1997, the State Employees Association of New Hampshire, (SEA), S.E.I.U., Local 1984, filed a petition to intervene which was followed by the County's objection filed on February 21, 1997. SEA's petition to intervene was withdrawn on February 19, 1997, (Decision No. 97-037) and a hearing held before the Board on the original petition on March 10, 1997.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- Findings of Fact enumerated in PELRB Decisions No. 93-168 (January 17, 1994) and 95-80 (September 7, 1995) are here incorporated by reference.
- At the hearing of March 20, 1997, the parties agreed 2. to a bargaining unit to consist of the positions determined to be appropriate in PELRB Decision No. 95-80 plus three additional positions, as noted below. The uncontested bargaining unit positions are: registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, certified nursing assistant, social worker, certified occupational therapy assistant, occupational therapy aide, beautician, barber, activities aide I and II, admissions secretary, transportation assistant/courier, unit clerk, unit aide, sterilization technician (See Decision No. 95-80, p.5) plus three positions which the parties agreed to add to the unit, namely, resident assistant, pharmacy assistant and pharmacy The parties also stipulated that the technician. psychiatric social worker is to be excluded.
- 3. The following positions were contested between the parties: housekeeping aide, laundry aide I and II, dietary secretary, dietary aide I and II, tray line supervisor, and maintenance worker I, II and III.
- 4. Job descriptions for the various positions were taken into evidence. (County Nos. 1, 3, 4, 6 and 7). Some of these (County Exhibit No. 3 and part of County Exhibit No. 6) were generated or revised after the date of the last hearing, July 20, 1995. The PELRB heard testimony regarding the duties of the contested positions.

DECISION AND ORDER

The County advocates adding several positions to the proposed bargaining unit but the evidence presented at the recent

hearing does not warrant such changes in the composition of the bargaining unit previously determined to be appropriate for the Merrimack County Nursing Home in Decision No. 95-80. There were no additional caregiving positions identified among the contested positions The only amendments to be made to the proposed bargaining unit are those agreed to by the parties at the recent hearing. (See Finding No. 2.)

The modified bargaining unit appropriate for the Merrimack County Nursing Home shall include the following positions: registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, certified nursing social worker, certified occupational therapy assistant, occupational therapy aide, beautician, assistant, barber, activities aide I and II, admissions secretary, transportation unit clerk, unit aide, sterilization assistant/courier, technician, resident assistant, pharmacy assistant and pharmacy technician.
