Accessible Parking Etiquette



Accessible Parking ETIQUETTE

Parking Etiquette calls for leaving van-accessible spaces for those who would benefit from them the most.

- Van-accessible access aisles are three feet larger than standard accessible parking access aisles.
- Three feet of additional access aisle space is necessary for someone in a vehicle with a ramp or a lift.
- The additional space is needed to allow a ramp or lift to lower to the ground and allow an individual to get in or out of a vehicle safely.
- Many individuals, because of their disability, also require a larger access aisle.



VAN-ACCESSIBLE PARKING

8

Feet.

A vehicle with a ramp or lift requires an 8' access aisle to lower the ramp or lift and allow the individual to exit or enter the vehicle safely.



ACCESSIBLE PARKING

5

Feet.

The standard accessible parking access aisle is 5' and too narrow for a ramp or lift-equipped vehicle to maneuver.

If you don't need the extra space, save it for someone who does.

**ACCESS
AISLES**



Do not park in an access aisle.

Not only is it illegal and dangerous, but the person in the accessible parking space may be blocked from getting in or out of their vehicle.
