THE POLICY RESEARCH SHOP AT THE NELSON A. ROCKEFELLER CENTER

The Policy Research Shop (PRS) is a faculty-directed and student-driven research enterprise conducted at the Rockefeller Center. Students who participate in the PRS are committed to providing accurate research that responds to the needs of elected and appointed policymakers and their staffs throughout the year. Our researchers examine emerging issues of concern that are relevant to policy discussions in both New Hampshire and Vermont. These topics are selected through a consultative process with policy stakeholders. The students make every effort to incorporate the research findings of policy experts from both states as well as from across the nation in this process.

The PRS typically produces reports with opportunities for follow-up research upon request. Our goal is to provide useful information in a clear format, and to deliver this information in a timely manner so that it is useful during policy deliberation. Our students work hard to bring their research skills to assist policy makers in meeting their policy needs.

Professor Shaiko is in his twenty-third year of college teaching and his ninth year at Dartmouth College as a senior fellow and associate director for curricular and research programs at the Rockefeller Center. In November of 2007, he received the Linda '82 and Paul Gridley Faculty Fellow Award from the Dean of the College; the award recognizes exemplary faculty involvement outside the classroom. He holds a B.A. in political science and history from Ursinus College and an M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. Prior to arriving at Dartmouth, he was the Fulbright Distinguished Chair in American Politics at the American Studies Center of Warsaw University in Poland during the 2000-2001 academic year. Throughout the decade of the 1990s, he held a tenured position in the department of government at American University in Washington, DC. During his time at American he was the founder and academic director of The Lobbying Institute. He also served as an American Political Science Association Congressional Fellow in 1993-1994 and served as a Democracy Fellow in the Center for Democracy and Governance at the United States Agency for International Development from December 1997 to November 1999. He is the author and editor of three books and author of more than two dozen journal articles and book chapters as well as more than a dozen U.S. government reports and publications. He serves as faculty mentor for the Gaming Study Commission project.
