## Executive Summary

The University of New Hampshire Survey Center included thirteen questions on its Summer 2019 Granite State Poll for the New Hampshire Office of Highway Safety. These questions have been asked every year since 2010. Five hundred two (502) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between July 29 and August 8, 2019. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

The following figures display survey results, detailed tabular results may be found in Appendix A, and Appendix B contains the survey instrument. Due to rounding, percentages may not add to 100%.

### Key Findings

#### Licensed Drivers

Nearly all New Hampshire residents report being licensed to drive in New Hampshire. Among the few who are not licensed to drive, only one in six say they have driven a motor vehicle in the past sixty days, the lowest proportion of unlicensed drivers since 2012.

#### Alcohol

More than four in five New Hampshire residents report that they have not driven a motor vehicle within two hours of drinking alcohol in the past thirty days while one in eight have done this 1 to 5 times in the past thirty days and one in twenty have done so more than 5 times. Responses to this question are largely unchanged over time.

Nearly two-thirds of residents have read, seen, or heard something about alcohol impaired driving enforcement in the past thirty days and a record high of three in ten believe a person will always or most of the time be arrested if they drive after drinking.

#### Seatbelts

Nearly three-quarters of New Hampshire residents say they always use a seat belt and responses to this question are largely unchanged since 2009. Only one in five report seeing something about seat belt enforcement recently.

Despite the fact that New Hampshire does not have a law requiring adults to wear seat belts, one in five residents believe a person who does not wear a seat belt will get a ticket at least half of the time.

Just over half of residents would support a mandatory seat belt law and support has increased slightly since 2018. Democrats, liberals, older respondents, and women are more likely to support this law while Independents, Republicans, conservatives, and men are less likely to support it.

#### Speeding

Three in ten New Hampshire residents say they always or most of the time drive faster than 35 miles per hour on a local road with a speed limit of 30 miles per hour while a similar number say they always or most of the time drive faster than 70 miles per hour on a road with a 65 miles per hour speed limit. Young people are more likely to report speeding this frequently.


Only just over four in ten residents say they have heard something about speed enforcement by police in the past thirty days, the lowest level of reported hearing about speed enforcement since the question was first asked.

Twenty-three percent say they drive that fast half of the time, 35% say they do so rarely, and 8% say they never do so. Just under a quarter believe a person who drives over the speed limit will always get a ticket or get one most of the time, largely unchanged since the question was first asked.

## Licensed Drivers


Nearly all New Hampshire residents (94%) report being licensed to drive in New Hampshire. Five percent are not licensed to drive and 1% are licensed in another state. Responses to this question have remained steady since the question was first asked in 2010 (Figure 1).


Figure 2: In the past 60 days, have you driven a motor vehicle?

Among those who report that they are not licensed to drive (N=24), 15% say they have driven a motor vehicle in the past 60 days while 85% say they have not done so. This represents the lowest reported percentage of unlicensed drivers who have recently driven a car since 2012 (Figure 2).

## Alcohol


**Figure 3: In the past 30 days, how many times have you driven a motor vehicle within 2 hours after drinking alcoholic beverages?**

Eighty-four percent of New Hampshire residents report that they have not driven a motor vehicle within two hours of drinking alcoholic beverages in the past thirty days. Thirteen percent say they have done so 1 to 5 times in the past thirty days, 2% report having done so more than 5 times, and 1% don't know or are unsure. Responses to this question have remained steady since the question was first asked in 2010 (Figure 3).

Sixty-three percent of New Hampshire residents report having read, seen, or heard something about alcohol impaired driving (or drunk driving) enforcement by police in the past thirty days. Thirty-six percent say they have not read, seen, or heard anything about this, while 1% don't know or are unsure.


The proportion of respondents who report having read, seen, or heard something in the past thirty days (63%) has slightly increased compared to August 2018 (55%) but is trending slightly down over time (Figure 4a).

**Figure 4a: In the past 30 days, have you read, seen, or heard anything about alcohol impaired driving (or drunk driving) enforcement by police?**




New Hampshire residents who attend religious service once or twice a month, *Union Leader* readers, and those who went to technical school or have some college education are more likely than others to say they read, seen, or heard anything about alcohol impaired driving enforcement by police in the past 30 days. Those who have completed postgraduate work are less likely to say they have read, seen, or heard anything in that time (Figure 4b).


Figure 5a: What do you think the chances are of someone getting arrested if they drive after drinking?

Thirty-one percent of New Hampshire residents believe a person will be arrested always (9%) or most of the time (22%) if they drive after drinking. This represents the largest proportion of respondents since the question was first asked in 2010. One-third of respondents (33%) believe a person will be arrested about half of the time if they drive after drinking, 32% believe someone will only rarely be arrested, 1% think someone in that situation will never be arrested, and 4% don't know or are unsure (Figure 5a).

New Hampshire residents who did not vote in 2016 are more likely than others to say someone who drives after drinking will be arrested always or most of the time while those aged 35 to 49, those who have completed postgraduate work, and NHPR listeners are less likely to feel this way (Figure 5b).

Figure 5b: Chance of Being Arrested if Driving After Drinking - by Selected Demographics



## Seatbelts


Figure 6a: How often do you use seat belts when you drive or ride in a car, van, sport utility vehicle, or pickup?

Nearly three-quarters of New Hampshire residents (74%) report that they always use a seat belt when riding in a motor vehicle, 11% say they do so most of the time, 4% say they do so about half of the time, 5% say they rarely do so, and 6% say they never do. Responses to this question have remained largely stable since the question was first asked in 2009 (Figure 6a).


Figure 6b: Frequency Using Seat Belt When in Motor Vehicle - by Selected Demographics

College graduates and those with more education are more likely than others to say they always wear a seat belt when in a motor vehicle. Those with a high school education or less and Central/Lakes Region residents are less likely to wear a seatbelt all of the time (Figure 6b).




**Figure 7b: Seen Anything About Seat Belt Enforcement in Past 60 Days - by Selected Demographics**

Eighteen percent of New Hampshire residents say they have read, seen, or heard something about seat belt law enforcement by police in the past sixty days, while 82% say they have not. The proportion of residents who report having read, seen, or heard something about this (18%) is slightly higher than in 2018 (12%) but is declining slightly over time (Figure 7a).

Central/Lakes Region residents are more likely than others to say they have read, seen, or heard something about seat belt law enforcement by police in the past sixty days (Figure 7b).

Nineteen percent of New Hampshire residents believe a person not wearing a seat belt will get a ticket half of the time or more often (4% always, 6% most of the time, 10% half of the time). One-third (33%) think a person not wearing a seat belt will only rarely get a ticket while 43% say they would never get a ticket. The proportion of respondents who believe that a person not wearing a seat belt will get a ticket half of the time or more often (19%) is marginally higher than in 2018 and near an all-time high.




Figure 8b: Chance of Getting Ticket if Not Wearing Seat Belt - by Selected Demographics

New Hampshire does not currently have a law requiring adults to wear seat belts so these figures are to be expected (Figure 8a).

Local newspaper readers and those who attend religious service once or twice a month are less likely than others to say a person not wearing a seat belt will get a ticket half of the time or more often (Figure 8b).

Fifty-seven percent of New Hampshire residents strongly (43%), or somewhat (14%) support a law requiring everyone in a moving vehicle to wear a seat belt. Six percent are neutral while 37% strongly (25%) or somewhat (12%) oppose such a law.

Support for a law requiring seat belt usage (57%) has increased slightly since 2018 (49%) and is at its highest point since the question was first asked in 2016 (Figure 9a).




Self-identified Democrats, self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, those aged 65 and older, Seacoast residents, local newspaper readers, and women are more likely than others to strongly or somewhat favor a law requiring everyone in a moving vehicle to wear a seat belt. Self-identified Independents and Republicans, Central/Lakes Region residents, men, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and self-described conservatives are less likely to favor such a law.

Over the past year, those who attend religious service once or twice a month, those who did not vote in 2016, and conservative radio listeners have become more likely to support such a law, while self-identified Independents and those who have completed postgraduate work have become less likely to support it (Figure 9b).

Strongly or Somewhat Favor




## Speeding

Three in ten New Hampshire residents (29%) report that they always (8%) or most of the time (21%) drive faster 35 miles per hour on a local road with a speed limit of 30 miles per hour. Twenty-three percent say they drive that fast half of the time, 35% say they do so rarely, and 8% say they never do so.




**Figure 10b: Frequency Driving 35 MPH on a Local Road with a 30 MPH Speed Limit - by Selected Demographics**

Responses to this question are largely unchanged since the question was first asked in 2010 (Figure 10a).

New Hampshire residents aged 18 to 34 are more likely than others to say that they always or most of the time drive faster than 35 miles per hour on a local road with a speed limit of 30 miles per hour while those who attend religious services once or twice a month and North Country residents are less likely to say they do so (Figure 10b).

Just over a quarter (27%) of New Hampshire residents report that they always (10%) or most of the time (17%) drive faster than 70 miles per hour on a road with a 65 miles per hour speed limit. Eighteen percent say they drive that fast half of the time, 35% say they do so rarely, and 19% say they never do so.


The proportion of respondents who say they always or most of the time drive faster than 70 miles per hour on a road with a 65 miles per hour speed limit (27%) is largely unchanged since 2018 (29%) but is trending slightly upward over time (Figure 11a).

**Figure 11a: On a road with a speed limit of 65 miles per hour, how often do you drive faster than 70 miles per hour?**




New Hampshire residents aged 18 to 34 are more likely than others to say that they always or most of the time drive faster than 70 miles per hour on a road with a speed limit of 65 miles per hour while those who attend religious service once or twice a month, North Country residents, and those aged 65 and older are less likely to say so (Figure 11b).

**Figure 11b: Frequency Driving 70 MPH on a Road with a 65 MPH Speed Limit - by Selected Demographics**






**Figure 12b: Seen, read, or heard anything about speed enforcement in past 30 days - by Selected Demographics**

Forty-three percent of New Hampshire residents report that in the past thirty days they read, saw, or heard something about speed enforcement by police while 57% say they have not. The proportion of residents who say they have read, saw, or heard something (43%) is at an all-time low (Figure 12a).

North Country residents are more likely than others to say that in the past thirty days they read, saw, or heard something about speed enforcement by police while Connecticut Valley residents are less likely to say so (Figure 12b).

Twenty-two percent of New Hampshire residents believe a person will get a ticket always (5%) or most of the time (17%) if they drive over the speed limit. Thirty-nine percent believe a person will get a ticket half of the time if speeding, 34% say they will only rarely get a ticket, and 2% say someone will never get a ticket in this situation.


Figure 13a: What do you think the chances are of getting a ticket if you drive over the speed limit?

Responses have remained largely steady since the question was first asked in 2010 (Figure 13a).

Union Leader readers and those who attend religious service once a week or more often are more likely than others to believe a person will always or most of the time get a ticket if they drive over the speed limit. Self-described liberals and those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 are less likely to say so (Figure 13b).

## Technical Report

### *How the Sample Was Selected*

The Summer 2019 Granite State Poll was a telephone survey of randomly selected adults in the state of New Hampshire. This survey was conducted using a procedure called Random Digit Dialing (RDD), of both landline and cellular telephone.

A sample of households in the area was selected by a procedure known as random digit dialing. The way this works is as follows. First, with the aid of a computer, one of the three digit telephone exchanges that are currently used in the state (e.g., 772) is randomly selected. The computer then randomly selects one of the "working blocks"--the first two of the last four numbers in a telephone number (e.g., 64)--and attaches it to the randomly selected exchange. Finally, the computer program then generates a two digit random number between 00 and 99 (e.g., 57) which is attached to the previously selected prefix (772), and the previously selected working block (64) resulting in a complete telephone number, i.e., 772 6457. This procedure is then repeated numerous times by the computer to generate more random numbers, so that we have a sufficient quantity to conduct the survey. The end result is that each household in the area in which there is a telephone has an equally likely chance of being selected into the sample. This procedure is done for both land line and cellular exchanges.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Scientific Telephone Samples (STS), Rancho Santa Margarita, CA. STS screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

Each of these randomly generated telephone numbers is called by one of our interviewers from a centrally supervised facility at the UNH Survey Center. If the number called is found not to be a residential one, it is discarded and another random number is called. If it is a residential number, the interviewer then randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equally likely chance of being included in the survey. No substitutions are allowed. If, for example, the randomly selected adult is not at home when the household is first contacted, the interviewer cannot substitute by selecting someone else who just happens to be there at the time. Instead, he or she must make an appointment to call back when the randomly selected adult is at home. In this way, respondent selection bias is minimized.

### *When the Interviewing Was Done*

New Hampshire adults in the Granite State Poll were interviewed between July 29 and August 8, 2019. Each selected respondent was called by a professional UNH Survey Center interviewer from a centrally supervised facility at the UNH Survey Center. Telephone calls during the field period were made between 9:00 AM and 9:00 PM.

### *Response Rates*

Interviews were completed with 502 randomly selected adults in New Hampshire from a sample of 15166 randomly selected telephone numbers. Using American Association for Public Opinion (AAPOR) Response Rate 4, the response rate for the Summer 2019 Granite State Poll was 14% percent. The formula to calculate standard AAPOR response rate is:

$$\frac{(I + P)}{(I + P) + (R + NC + O) + e(UH + UO)}$$

I=Complete Interviews, P=Partial Interviews, R=Refusal and break off, NC=Non-Contact, O=Other, e=estimated portion of cases of unknown eligibility that are eligible, UH=Unknown household, UO=Unknown other.

### *Weighting of Data*

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, level of education and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.

### *Sampling Error*

The Granite State Poll, like all surveys, is subject to sampling error due to the fact that all residents in the area were not interviewed. For those questions asked of five hundred (500) or so respondents, the error is +/-4.4%. For those questions where fewer than 500 persons responded, the sampling error can be calculated as follows:

$$Sampling\ Error = \pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{P(1 - P)}{N}}$$

Where P is the percentage of responses in the answer category being evaluated and N is the total number of persons answering the particular question.

For example, suppose you had the following distribution of answers to the question, "Should the state spend more money on road repair even if that means higher taxes?" Assume 1,000 respondents answered the question as follows:

YES	47%
NO	48%
DON'T KNOW	5%

The sampling error for the "YES" percentage of 47% would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{47(53)}{1000}} = \pm 3.1\%$$

for the "NO" percentage of 48% it would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{48(52)}{1000}} = \pm 3.1\%$$

and for the "DON'T KNOW" percentage of 5% it would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{5(95)}{1000}} = \pm 1.4\%$$

In this case we would expect the true population figures to be within the following ranges:

YES	43.9% - 50.1% (i.e., 47% ±3.1%)
NO	44.9% - 51.1% (i.e., 48% ±3.1%)
DON'T KNOW	3.6% - 6.4% (i.e., 5% ±1.4%)

The margin of sampling error for the Summer 2019 Granite State Poll is +/- 4.4 percent.

### *Design Effect*
