
Philip Shepard Resident Spotlight - 2020

Phil was born in the summer of 1925 in Laconia, NH. At the age of 18, Phil enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps where he served as a Corporal from 1943 until 1946. While in the Army Air Corps, Phil was a radar and radio mechanic in the Army Air Force Tech in Boca Raton, Florida. There he primarily worked on airplanes but also completed a

variety of other mechanical repairs. Phil was in the 234th Army Air Force Base Unit and is a recipient of the American Theater Campaign Ribbon Victory Medal.

After his service, Phil returned to New Hampshire and obtained his college degree at Hesser Business College in Manchester. He went on to work as an insurance claims adjuster and was often able to travel throughout New Hampshire and Vermont for work.

When not working, Phil enjoyed lakeside activities with his family at Dockham Shores. His daughter, Ginny, and son, Stan, call him "an accomplished outdoorsman, hunter and fisherman."
