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

Commandant's Report

We've had an exceptional year at the New Hampshire Veterans Home so far in 2016, and things are shaping up for a great second half.

It started well as the Home made it through flu season with no major outbreaks and minimal impacts on residents and staff. After a brutal flu season in early 2015 that forced us to impose a five-week quarantine that closed the doors to visits by family and friends and severely limited outside activities, it was a welcome relief.

Infection control efforts were outstanding throughout, with a proactive get-yourfree-flu-shot campaign, and a constant emphasis on hygiene and handwashing for both residents and staff to prevent disease spread.

There also was good news from our annual site survey by the Department of Veterans Affairs in April. The team of evaluators, who do a top-to-bottom evaluation of all aspects of our operations, both clinical and non-clinical, didn't find a single item to cite in their report.

This was our first zero-deficiency survey in a number of years, and it's a great tribute to the hard work that our dedicated staff in all departments do every day, not just when an inspection is coming. A huge thank-you goes to all the staff members who made this possible.

We've got a busy summer ahead, with lots of trips and activities scheduled for residents, and our ever-popular annual Cruise Night set for 6-8 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 4. The event always draws lots of rides from Detroit's Golden Age and stirs many good memories for our veterans.

If you're celebrating events this summer with some legal fireworks, please remember to be considerate of our veteran population when you do so. The unexpected cracks and booms of pyrotechnics

Implementing a prescription for progress

The New Hampshire Veterans Home is edging closer to the starting gate for the next phase of our implementation of a fully electronic medical records system.

Three wireless medication carts, a key element in the electronic medication record module, have arrived on site as we await installation of wireless access points throughout the resident areas of the building that will let the carts connect to a central medication database even as nursing staff moves from room to room.

Actual rollout of this piece isn't expected until fall. Besides the wireless access, vendors will still need to integrate the software with our existing computer systems. and more than 100 additional staff members will need to be trained on the system.

Commandant Margaret "Peggy" LaBrecque said the initial three carts will be fully tested to make sure they meet our needs before a larger order is placed.

Once fully implemented, the EMAR module will integrate entry of physicians' orders with the pharmacy system to streamline order transcription and medication administration, reducing the possibility of er-

Eventually, when the entire EMR system is fully implemented, it's expected to supplant paper-based record keeping for most other important as-



pects of resident care, including tracking participation in activities, staff contact hours, and more. This will bring the New Hampshire Veterans Home into line with the current best practices in the health and long-term care indus-



third-floor addition that will add more beds to the New Hampshire Veterans Home's Life Enhancement Department of Veterans Affairs, Dementia Units is now projected to start in April, 2018.

In the latest developments in April, the New Hampshire Executive Council approved a \$1.15 million contract with Colby Engineering for the initial phases of the project.

The company will be examining drawings and checking actual site conditions to make sure the structure can meet current building and life-safety code requirements.

The LEDU units, 100 beds of state-of-the-art dementia care, were opened in 2004. The building was designed with the third-floor upward expansion in mind. However, building and seismic codes have changed over the past dozen years, so the entire job is getting a careful second look.

The Executive Council had

Construction of a long-awaited previously approved \$4.7 million as the state's share of the construction funding. Capital funds from the State Home Construction Grant Program will be requested to provide the other \$8.8 million of the \$13.5 million total cost of the pro-

> The current plan, pending Colby Engineering's studies, is to submit a completed design to the VA in June of 2017, and begin work the following spring.

The expansion will help to fill the constantly growing need for dementia and Alzheimers diseaserelated care the Home has seen in recent years, Commandant Margaret "Peggy" LaBrecque said, an increase probably attributable to improved diagnosis.

The LEDU units currently have veterans approved but waiting, and even with the expansion, the demand for these beds will continue to outpace availability, she said.

Army captain who served five vears in Vietnam. He had a lifelong commitment to education and was involved with local high school sports much of his life.

Natalie Fogarty, Mr. Fogarty's widow, said "Our family is so pleased to be able to "give back" in some measure to the staff of the Veterans Home. We know they all give far more than their job requires on a daily basis."

In three years since the program's inception, 10 individuals with various ties to the Home have received a total of \$5,900 in educational aid.
